Irish Whiskey Available in .75 & 1.5 ounce pours

2 Gingers

Faithfully distilled at the famed Kilbeggan Distillery in Ireland. This award-winning spirit is smooth, malty, and slightly sweet to start, with a tingle of honey and citrus. The woody essence of this four-year-aged blend suggests caramel and vanilla to the finish. **3.5/7**

Bushmills 10 Year Single Malt

Triple distilled from 100% malted barley and matured for a minimum of 10 years mainly in Bourbon-seasoned barrels, it has aromas of honey, vanilla and milk chocolate. **5.5/11**

Bushmills Black Bush

A rich, dark, Irish blend, Black Bush contains a high proportion of triple-distilled single malt, aged in Oloroso sherry casks for around 8-10 years. Picked up the top prize in its category at the World Whisky Awards 2010. **4.5/9**

Hellcat Maggie

Distilled in County Louth, Ireland, using the traditional single copper pot still method, it's named after a feared streetfighter and member of the notorious Dead Rabbits gang that roamed the Five Points area of Manhattan in the 1840s. **4/8**

Jameson Irish

Produced at the Midelton Distillery, Jameson is Ireland's quintessential Irish blend, a classic. **4/8**

Kilbeggan

Kilbeggan is a blended Irish whiskey made at Cooley distillery in County Louth. Named after the distillery of the same name dating back to 1757, this is an elegant, sweet and malty blend. **4/8**

Midleton Very Rare

The 2015 edition of Midleton Very Rare. The flagship blend from Ireland's biggest distillery (home of Jameson), it is a small batch blend released annually, generally to universal acclaim. **15/30**

Paddy Old

A well-known blend, reputedly named after a gregarious travelling sales rep for the distillery who made sure that everyone who crossed his path tried a glass. **4/8**

Powers Gold Label

Powers Gold label is a blend of approximately 70% pot still and 30% grain whiskey. It currently has sales of over 2.5 million bottles per year. It is the most popular Irish whiskey sold in Ireland. **4/8**

Red Breast 12 Year

Red Breast is a beautifully balanced single pot still Irish whiskey, with a warm, generous texture, rich, sweet flavours and a spicy kick. In the view of many connoisseurs, the finest Irish whiskey available. **7.5/15**

Teeling Small Batch

Produced by the Teeling Whiskey Company, this is a delicious small-batch blend, with a very high malt content. Interestingly, it's also been matured in rum casks for added spice. **4.5/9**

The Dubliner

The Dubliner Irish Whiskey is a blend of single malt and grain whiskies, aged in Bourbon casks which are individually selected for blending, giving a warm and smooth whiskey, with a lasting finish. **4.25/8.5**

The Irishman Original Clan

The Irishman Founder's Reserve, a blend of 70% single malt and 30% single pot still whiskeys, is triple distilled and aged in bourbon casks. Jim Murray's Whisky Bible awarded it 93 points, calling it 'a quite wonderful blend'. **4.5/9**

Tullamore Dew

Tullamore Dew is a resoundingly popular Irish blend, particularly in overseas markets, where it is second only to Jameson. Very approachable. **4.5/9**

BRIEF HISTORY OF IRISH WHISKEY

WHISKEY DERIVES FROM THE GAELIC UISCE BEATHA, MEANING "WATER OF LIFE" AND HAS BEEN MADE IN IRELAND SINCE ABOUT THE 12TH CENTURY. THE DRINK IS ESSENTIALLY DISTILLED BEER, WHICH CAN BE MADE FROM ANY GRAIN, THOUGH CORN AND BARLEY ARE THE MOST COMMON. FOR CENTURIES, THE BEER WAS DISTILLED IN POT STILLS, WHOSE VERY INEFFICIENCY AT REMOVING IMPURITIES GIVES THE DRINK ITS CHARACTER. IN 1831, IRISHMAN AENEAS COFFEY PATENTED THE FIRST COLUMN STILL, WHICH DISTILLS CONTINUOUSLY AND THUS RESULTS IN A PURER SPIRIT. THE CONTINUOUS STILL, AS IT'S ALSO KNOWN, ALLOWED FOR THE MASS PRODUCTION OF SPIRITS. BUT WHISKEY PRODUCERS STILL IMPART FLAVOR TO THEIR ENTRY-LEVEL PRODUCTS BY BLENDING WHISKEYS, AND THE GREATEST WHISKEYS ARE MADE IN POT STILLS.
